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Message from the Chief

It is my pleasure to present the 2022 South Lyon Fire Department annual report. Since becoming Fire Chief in March of 2022, the City Manager, Mayor, City Council, City personnel, and members of the Fire Department have all been extremely



supportive and welcoming. It has been a smooth transition and I would like to thank everyone involved.

2022 was the busiest year on record for the South Lyon Fire Department (SLFD). In 2022, the department responded to 1,079 incidents, which was a slight increase in incident responses from that of 2021. Similar to Fire Departments across the state, the South Lyon Fire Department has seen a dramatic, 67% increase in the number of incident responses over the past decade.

Over the past year, the Department has worked to update our standard operating procedures, on-the-job (OJT) training processes for new hires, and made some purchases to upgrade some fire and EMS equipment.

Being a part-time and paid-on-call department, it is not uncommon for some fluctuation of staffing as people's fulltime careers and family obligations pull them from the area and in many different directions. With people's busy personal lives and the significant increase in state mandated training and continued education requirements over the past few years, it is truly a tribute to the dedication your South Lyon firefighters have for their community.

It is my honor and privilege to work alongside the compassionate and dedicated members of the South Lyon Fire Department and I hope you find this report informative. If you have any questions about our work or suggestions on how we can improve, please reach out to me or anyone on our staff.

Vision Statement





- *** Because of limited staff numbers and never knowing who is available to respond to a larger incident, every person on staff regardless of rank can and will work 'on the ground' as a firefighter at some point.

Staffing & Schedule


The fire station is staffed with one to two firefighters during the day (see table below for times). They work 10- or 12-hour shifts each day. Firefighters who work shifts are supported by paid-on-call firefighters when dispatched to incidents. In the event of a significant incident which requires more personnel than the shift working, paid-on-call firefighters will respond to the station, gear up, and then respond in an apparatus to the incident to assist the shift personnel. On minor events, it is common for the shift personnel to respond to the incident alone and the paid-on-call firefighters will respond to backfill the fire station. The backfill personnel prepare for another incident in the event an incident occurs concurrently. In 2022, there were 72 instances where there were 2 incidents that occurred concurrently. There were 3 instances where 3 incidents occurred concurrently.


Incident Responses


For the calendar year, the South Lyon Fire Department responded to 1,079 incidents. 2022 was the highest number of incident responses recorded in the history of the department.








Training

Jon Soave was recently promoted to the department's training officer position. He has over twenty years of fire experience and is an excellent teacher and mentor. SLFD has had multiple valuable training, many hands-on since Officer Soave accepted the promotion. His experience and ability to convey information is invaluable for SLFD firefighters.



Training Burn Containers

The live fire training burn containers were installed, and the interior construction was completed by firefighters in early spring of 2022. The containers have been used multiple times for live burn trainings since. It provides live fire experience in a controlled environment, supervised by senior officers, and has multiple safety facets in place. Going through evolutions with real heat and lack of visibility provides firefighters with invaluable experience that cannot be duplicated in any other way. Firefighters have gained experience and confidence, preparing them for real events where the environment will be less predictable and where direct officer oversight is not practical.




2022 Training Statistics

Gravel Pad Installation

South Lyon's DPW installed a gravel pad around the burn container. This prevents mud, the potential of apparatuses becoming stuck, as well as providing a clean and safe area for other trainings to occur outside the burn containers.




Thermal Imaging Camera

In 2022, the monies for a new thermal imaging camera (TIC) were budgeted. The department purchased a FLIR K53, truck mounted charging TIC and has already put it to use on several occasions. The new technology is significantly improved over the previous TIC. Below is an example of the TIC in use at one of our live fire burn trainings where without the camera, visibility conditions were zero, completely dark and black. Firefighters could not see their hand held in front of their face without the TIC. The TIC will assist firefighters in quickly locating victims in a structure fire as well as fires hidden in walls or other void spaces that could be easily missed.







Rescue Task Force Bags

Lieutenant Conrad worked to purchase the supplies for "rescue task force" bags to be placed on every SLFD fire apparatus. In the event there is ever any type of active shooter incident, these

bags are smaller in size (compared to the standard EMS bag) and carry special equipment and supplies specific to "stop the bleed" type injuries. Studies have shown that rapid intervention teams



where firefighters are entering the "warm zone" with police officers is the most effective way to save lives in a shooting type incident. We pray that we never need to



utilize these tools; however, SLFD and SLPD are prepared.





Fire Prevention

Brad Moynihan was recently promoted to Fire Marshal. He has brought Fire Prevention in the SLFD from primarily a division that provides only inspections to a multifaceted Fire Prevention Division. He performs plan reviews, code

Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Installation Program

The State of Michigan has a program, "MI Prevention Smoke Alarms". The program is designed for Fire Departments to provide Fire Departments' smoke and carbon monoxide detectors at no cost from the state. The Fire Departments then install the alarms in the community they serve.


Currently, the SLFD has been installing smoke and carbon monoxide alarms at no charge for the residents of South Lyon. The residents simply need to contact the Fire Department and leave their contact information. When the department has the alarms in stock, they will contact the resident and set up a time for firefighters to come and install them in their home.

The state permits the department to install up to six smoke alarms and one carbon monoxide detector per residence.





The SLFD will continue this program as long as alarms are accessible from the State of Michigan.





Fire Station Floors




New Ladder Truck

South Lyon Fire Department was scheduled to receive our new ladder truck delivered and inservice around mid-December of 2022. In mid-October, Smeal brought Captain Armstrong, Deputy Fire Chief Weir, and Chief Thorington out to Nebraska for a final inspection and to go over the truck with a fine-tooth comb. There were some minor issues noted and Smeal made the changes to the truck immediately while it was still in the factory. There were some unforeseen delays, so the delivery now appears it will be closer to the end of February to early March. It is truly an amazingly nice truck. We look forward to getting it in service soon!
